
The photo opposite shows QZ at the Stirling Ranges camp. →

TIPS FOR BEGINNERS

The last few months has seen the emergence of several very keen student pilots. Without mentioning names thanks a lot to those of you who have made the effort to help out at West Beach and have given some of the ground crew at Lochiel a bit of a push to get you involved. By the end of the month we should have some super new winch drivers. Heavy sighs of relief for a few of us. Anyway a few things you may not have picked up on yet.

- 1. The overnight accommodation fee at Lochiel is \$2.00 per night. If you stay over you should write your name in the red covered book which says "Accommodation" on it. If you put your \$2.00 in the cash tin tick your name otherwise it will be charged to your account.
- 2. Remember to shut the 2 gates on the fence around the clubhouse when leaving Lochiel. This stops the sheep eating our trees and shrubs and leaving the left overs on the ground. Always make sure you close the access gate to the airfield.
- 3. On the mailing label on this newsletter, in the top right hand corner is your account balance. If it is negative please make a payment to your account to get it in the black. If you think the balance is incorrect ask the treasurer for a statement that you can check.
- 4. Hot days are hopefully going to be with us from now on. Don't forget to drink lots of water, and slip, slop, slap.
- 5. Payments for flying should be made on the day you fly otherwise the treasurer will be sad.
- 6. After 10 flights you must join the Gliding Federation of Australia (GFA). There is a ready reckoner at Lochiel with the current rates on it. If you have any technical questions about the GFA ask an instructor.
- 7. Have lots of fun flying.

TIPS FOR EVERYONE

- 1. The winch aerial connection on top of the winch cage has been fixed by Kevin Zietz. Thanks Kevin. When the winch is put away at the end of the day the aerial should be removed and put in the cab to prolong its life.
- 2. To help the farmer and protect our interest in keeping our airfield, please put all scrap cable in the bin. If you are walking along keep an eye out for bits of cable, pick them up and dispose of them. Weak links should not be kept in the tyres at the launch point, instead hook them over the aerial of the base-set.

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
Gliding at the Stirling Ranges



SPORTS CLASS NATIONALS AT REMARK

This is a butchering of an article sent to the augc-people mailing list by Peter Temple.

The dates of this event are Monday 15/1/96 to Fri 26/1/96. Redmond will be flying the Bergfalke to Renmark on Saturday or Sunday. Practice days are on the Sunday and Monday. The competition runs for 11 days with a presentation dinner on the last Friday. It is a handicapped competition with separate two seater and single seater classes and pilot optioned tasking.

Flying Costs - The entry fee is \$125.00 per aircraft. This will be divided among the people that fly the Bergfalke (probably \$8.00 per person per day). Launch fees are roughly \$10.00 for winch and \$30.00 for aerotow to 2000'.

Accommodation - Renmark GC have reserved 2 rooms in their clubrooms for AUGC people. One is taken but the other has 3 beds in it. The clubrooms are air-conditioned but are not likely to have cooking facilities or refrigeration. Peter has access to a caravan with a stove, fridge and three double beds. A powered site on field can be made available and there are 2 caravan parks in Renmark.

It is questionable if there will be flying over this period at Lochiel as most of the instructors will be in Renmark.

Targets For The Soaring Season & The "Bar Chart"

I am trying to record goals for our solo pilots to aim for over the soaring season. These targets are tailored to the individual and are being set so they will take some effort (and good luck?) to achieve.

I would like to catch up with the remainder of our pilots in the next couple of weeks and sort out a goal (or goals) with them. It is intended that we will have a grand accounting around May sometime. It should provide some amusing newsletter content! Goals set so far have included A, B, C certificate, Silver badge, Gold badge, 500km in a Boomerang (guess who), 300km in the ES59 Arrow (also guess who!), Assistant Instructor rating etc.

Those who have bothered to browse the notice board in the clubhouse recently will have come across the "Bar Chart" which is pinned there. Anyone who flies cross country should add their name to the chart and extend a bar showing their cumulative cross country kilometres. The scale of the chart changes in about the middle, so it will be relatively easy to reach the centre, but will take a bunch of long cross countries to reach the end of the chart.

The rules of the bar chart are as follow:


- 1. A cross country flight must be declared before launch. Verbal declaration is sufficient. Turn points or distance don't have to be declared.
- 2. Turn point photographs and barograph traces are not required. (We're trusting folks!).
- 3. Both pilots in a 2 seater should record the full distance covered (Let's be real it's twice as hard to get there in a 2 seater).

Simon Hackett got in an early, short cross country and hence got his name at the top of the chart.

The Bergfalke was put back into service on Saturday (25/11) and the shed extension is nearing completion.


The workshop has the following items outstanding:
